Why you're here today

The housing management sector has a vital role to help improve recycling rates

- Waste and recycling legislation and services are undergoing significant changes.
 From April 2026, all households* are legally required to have a full recycling service including food waste.
- Local authorities are preparing to rollout new and improved services and often need support and collaboration from managing agents to do so successfully.
- Across the country, 4 million households live in purpose-built flats 1.4 million of these are in London. Many don't have access to recycling services.
- Making it easier for people who live in flats to recycle benefits everyone the residents, managing agents, local authorities and the environment.


What is it?

- From 1 April 2026 every household in England should have a collection service for:
 - Glass, metal (cans, aerosols and foil), plastic bottles pots tubs and trays, paper and card
 - Separation of paper and card from other materials (where practicable)
 - Food waste (a weekly collection)
 - From April 2027 this will also include plastic film (plastic bags and wrapping)
- This also applies to your offices / place of work. Businesses in England (includes office blocks) were required to have these services in place from April 2025, with micro-firms (10 people or less) from April 2027



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What's in our rubbish bins?




Key takeaway:

- The rubbish bins are full of items that could be recycled
- Around 60% of items being put in the rubbish bins could be recycled in the food or recycling bins

Why does improving recycling for flats matter?

Estimated capture of recycling from flats in London



There is a huge opportunity to improve recycling for people living in flats

This would increase recycling rates, reduce carbon emissions and reduce the costs of waste disposal, and improve services for residents.

Where does recycling and rubbish go once its collected?



Material: Recycling (glass, paper, cans, plastics)
Where: Materials recovery / recycling facility
How:

- Baled into different materials & sent for processing back into new items
- Preserves raw materials, saves energy, water and carbon emissions





Material: Food waste

Where: Anaerobic Digestion plant

How:

- Industrial composting, producing liquid which is used as fertiliser, and energy
- Saves embedded nutrients, energy, and carbon emissions





Material: Rubbish bins

Where: Energy from Waste plants

- Burns waste, produces electricity
- Burning plastic is a high carbon emission activity





How might Simpler Recycling affect your properties?

- You will need to have in place a recycling service for glass/plastic/paper etc.

 Some councils *may* introduce a separate card and paper bin
- You will need to have a weekly food waste collection service (for *most* councils this is by 1st April 2026)
- Councils will also need to collect plastic film (e.g. carrier bags) (by 1st April 2027)

How might food be provided to your block? (if not yet provided)

Residents are provided with a small indoor food caddy (liners may or may not be provided)



Resident fills the caddy with their food waste



Emptied into a larger food waste bin (in the bin area) which is collected **every week**













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How might dry recycling be provided to your block? (if not yet provided)

Leaflet on how to use the service and what can be recycled (might be offered a reusable recycling bag).



This is filled with their recyclable items



Recycling emptied into the recycling bins loose.









What are the benefits to your properties?

Less confusion

 Residents across all properties will be able to recycle the same items, regardless of location. This may make it easier for you to communicate with your residents about recycling.

Cleaner bin stores

- Weekly food waste collections means cleaner bin stores - food is not left sat in your rubbish bins causing smells / leaks
- More people are recycling means fewer overflowing rubbish bins

Corporate Sustainability targets

 Help towards meeting your carbon, waste or sustainability targets



Other legislation



Emissions Trading Scheme

- Sending materials made from fossil carbon (plastic) will incur additional charges from 2028 (tbc).
- Applies to any waste sent to an Energy from Waste plant

This will increase the cost of sending rubbish to an EfW facility - for example if you pay to have contaminated bins emptied or extra rubbish collections



Deposit Return Scheme/pEPR

- A small deposit will be placed on all drinking containers which can be redeemed by returning it for recycling
- Producers will pay for the collection and disposal of packaging from households

This might **reduce** the number of drinking cans/bottles in your recycling & rubbish bins, making them less full (helping prevent overflows), and reduce the amount of non-recyclable packaging waste



Persistent Organic Pollutants

- In 2023, legislation was updated on how soft furnishings - like sofas have to be disposed of because they contain harmful chemicals.
- This means they now have to be sent to an EfW and not landfill, and cannot be recycled

This may **increase** costs of disposing of dumped waste like sofas or chairs in bin areas

Ease

Effective recycling is achieved when...

Residents <u>find it easy</u> to recycle

Services that fit with people's existing routines will feel easier to use

Knowledge

Effective recycling is achieved when...

Residents know <u>how</u> to recycle

Lack of easy access to accurate information can undermine confidence

Motivation

Effective recycling is achieved when...

Residents <u>want</u> to recycle

Poor experiences and an apparent lack of accountability can be demotivating

The Flats Recycling Package (FRP)

- The Flats Recycling Package is a set of operational and communications guidelines, based on our research
- Both projects with Peabody Housing
- Evidence based guidance that has been shown to increase recycling by up to 40% and cut the amount of contamination on estates by a quarter





Making recycling work for people in flats: Toolkit for the Flats Recycling Package



Before: Lack of signage, overflows, rubbish chutes on some estates

After:

All waste streams co-located, chutes closed Reverse lids, large apertures for recycling bins, new signage New food waste bins and push pedal housing units In home storage, communications and engagement campaign



Council support available to your blocks

Communications



- Most will provide items such as bin stickers, internal posters or leaflets for free
- Check websites as many have downloadable packs or information for you to share with your tenants

Recycling containers



 Some boroughs provide funded packages to help upgrade your recycling bins or will swap out older bins with new ones

Food containers



- Free indoor and external food bins
- Some provide a roll of free food liners
- Some councils may provide free 'housing units' on a first come first serve/needs basis

Helping maximise success

1 Communicating with tenants:

Using your channels (WhatsApp groups / emails / newsletters) to inform and promote the scheme or using new tenant packs to explain correct bin use

2 Delivery coordination and identifying space:

Helping identify where new food or recycling bins can go
Making sure council delivery teams can access properties / bin stores to deliver food caddies / new bins
Helping with deliveries at larger sites e.g., caretakers or on-site concierges

Working in partnership:

Providing boroughs your most recent contact details to be able to coordinate or undertake site surveys Ensuring codes / keys are up to date and given to the council Reporting missed collections / maintaining bins / bin stores
Informing on site staff so everyone is aware of the changes

Summary

- Legislation from April 2026 means that the way councils collect waste from your blocks might change
- Councils can't do this alone councils, residents, landlords, managing agents and social housing providers are requested to work together to help implement Government changes.
- Remember the principles of *Ease*, *Knowledge* and *Motivation* when looking at where to put new bins and make the service as successful as it can be all are interoperable and rely on one another to make recycling happen
- Check with your local council what support they will provide - many provide free bins, signage or information for your tenants. Some may have this information ready to download from their website.



Further support

Managing agents and landlords might need help to implement service changes and improvement projects.
